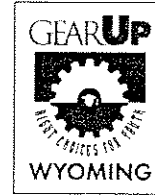
<p>Tutoring/homework assistance/academic enrichment</p>	<p>Tutoring: Lunch time, study periods, & after school tutoring in academic subjects (one-on-one, small group). Homework Assistance: Completing homework, make-up work due to absences. Academic Enrichment: Topical presentations made to students during the academic year, science presentation by university faculty member, Saturday program on poetry writing, special in-class presentations that are sponsored by GEAR UP (could be school-based or after school).</p>
<p>Computer assisted lab</p>	<p>Computer Assisted Lab: workshops, computer-based remediation, computer-based career awareness online mentoring, computer skills, online SAT or ACT prep. Afterschool computer programs.</p>
<p>Mentoring</p>	<p>Mentoring: A formal structured program of one-on-one, meaningful individual contact that facilitates a student's educational, social and personal growth through a supportive, ongoing relationship. The types of conversations between a mentor and mentee should include the mentor sharing her/his life experiences (especially those that apply to academic achievement and postsecondary planning and preparation), helping the student solve problems, making future plans, setting goals and exchanging information and ideas.</p>
<p>Counseling/advising/academic planning/career counseling</p>	<p>Counseling: Meeting with students one-on-one or in small group to discuss personal growth issues such as decision making, goal setting, behavior concerns, family issues, home visits. Advising: Providing individual assistance to students on college choices, college planning, financial aid planning. Academic Planning: Providing individual or small group assistance to students or parents on coursework selection, course of study choices, college major selection, SAT, PSAT, or ACT advising or interpretation of scores assistance with placement tests. Career Counseling: Providing individual or small group assistance to students or parents about career choices, career planning, internships, or career interests.</p>
<p>College visit/college student shadowing</p>	<p>College visit: A physical visit to a college campus. The primary objective of the event would be to conduct a college visit (in other words, the primary objective is not another activity such as a cultural or sporting event). Must include activities such as a campus tour, presentations by admissions, academic departments, athletics, student affairs, residence life, multicultural affairs and/or other college departments. College Student Shadowing: A one-on-one or small group experience in which a middle or high school student spends an hour or more with a current college student on a college campus seeing college life from the perspective of a typical undergraduate.</p>
<p>Job site visit/job shadowing</p>	<p>Job site visit: An individual or small group experience in which students visit a place of employment to learn about a specific job or career and the skills/education required. Job shadowing: A one-on-one experience in which a middle or high school student spends time at a work site observing and learning about an individual's work.</p>

<p>Summer programs</p>	<p>Summer programs: Any GEAR UP enrichment program held during the summer break. Summer programs may include college visits, instruction, tutoring, job shadowing, and/or college planning workshops. Summer Academies include, life skills, college interaction with college faculty, financial aid/scholarship workshops, career exploration, college planning workshop, cultural activity, and if possible a residential program (make sure the academy description in the database indicates summer academy). Please include all hours in a summer program in this category and provide detail about the activities in the GEAR UP Monthly Activity Report.</p>
<p>Educational field trips</p>	<p>Educational field trips: Activities that have academic enrichment as a fundamental purpose. Examples would include a science demonstration on a college campus (the purpose of the event was the science demonstration, not a college visit); a group trip to attend a concert, meet with the musicians, and have a backstage tour; a group visit to see a play that students studied in a previous GEAR UP activity; an academic competition. These events are linked closely to what students are learning in other GEAR UP activities.</p>
<p>Workshops</p>	<p>Workshops: An educational seminar or series of meetings emphasizing interaction and exchange of information among a usually small number of students that includes working on a group project, discussing a topic, or examining a specific topic. Examples include classes about financial aid, college choice, GED programs for parents, paying for college, Kick-off events, assemblies, and awareness programs about the benefits of college.</p>
<p>Family events</p>	<p>Family events: A GEAR UP sponsored event that includes GEAR UP students and parents/guardians. The events are not workshop oriented but they do include meaningful information and/or materials directly relating to the GEAR UP Wyoming grant objectives.</p>
<p>Cultural events</p>	<p>Cultural events: Events that have as their fundamental purpose to expose students to the arts, music, diversity/multiculturalism and/or service learning events that develop citizenship, responsibility, and many other positive character traits. Examples include a theater production, a concert, a museum visit, a diversity celebration or a community service project.</p>
<p>Other</p>	<p>Other: N/A</p>

Workshops on college preparation/financial aid	Workshops: Examples include classes about financial aid, college choice, GED programs for parents, paying for college. Kick-off events, and awareness programs about the benefits of college.

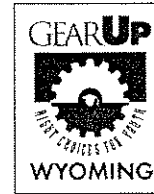
